Community Demands Proposal

**PROPOSED BY THE JACKSONVILLE COMMUNITY
ACTION COMMITTEE**

A proposal highlighting the immediate demands of our community, as well as the demands for a true solution moving forward so that the issues do not continue.

A proposal drafted in line with the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression to enact a Civilian Police Accountability Council in Jacksonville. (JPAC)

A proposal to cap the JSO budget at 20% (half of their current allocation) and reinvest the remaining funds into the community.



Immediate Demands

- Drop all charges on protesters arrested for demanding police accountability in Duval County
- Indict officers who have been accused of misconduct.
- Cap JSO spending to no more than 20% of the city budget (half of their current margin)

Demands for Long Term Solutions

- Community Control of the Police through the creation of a Jacksonville Police Accountability Council (JPAC), as modeled by the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression.
- Commitment from our elected officials to participate in the call to abolish FL statute 112.532, The FL Officers' Bill of Rights



Proposal for Lasting Accountability in the form of JPAC

A Jacksonville Civilian Police Accountability Council (JPAC) is a review board modeled after the Chicago model (CPAC) proposed by the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression. In 2019, Jacksonville and organizers from around the country were called to unite on the demand for a Civilian Police Accountability Council in their area.

The Structure of a JPAC

A democratically elected board of civilians (no relation to JSO in any capacity) from each police district, with the oversight power to:

- Subpoena Evidence (such as body camera footage)
- Assist in hire/fire practices
- Create and oversee trainings
- Participate in misconduct trials
- Assure Transparency



Commitment to the Abolition of FL statute 112.532

We are calling all leadership to challenge legislation that grants police accused of misconduct extra due process protections. There can be no trust if one side has legislation that places them above the law.

Creation of a People's Budget

JSO will no longer receive disproportionate funding from the city budget. Their budget amount will be decreased, and will not exceed 20% moving forward. The remaining funds will be distributed between community organizations, and the council will be intentional about meeting regularly with community leaders, with particular focuses on the quadrants that have dire infrastructural needs.
